
The main change in the approach of the waiver redesign is moving from an algorithm that determines funding to an assessment tool that determines service needs and the associated funding.

Allow more group homes to qualify for AHCA Medicaid Assistive Care Services funding. Have the funding follow the waiver individual when they turn 21 from AHCA's Medicaid State Plan to APD.

Expand the Department of Children and Families Florida Assertive Community Treatment and Community Action Team (FACT and CAT) programs to better serve people who have both mental health issues and developmental disabilities.

Increase overall funding so our agencies can provide Florida's most vulnerable population with medically necessary services in the most appropriate setting.

#### FLORIDA'S FISCAL EFFORT RANKS SECOND TO LAST FOR TOTAL IDD SPENDING


Over the past 40 years (FYs 1977 – 2017) total adjusted spending for publicly funded programs for persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) in the state of Florida have increased an average of 4.1% per year. Despite these increases, Florida ranks 50th out of the 50 states and the District of Columbia in terms of fiscal effort for total IDD spending in FY 2017 (see page 2 of this brief) despite having the 4th largest economy in the US. In fact, Florida's fiscal effort for total IDD spending in FY2017 is 3.1% lower than it was prior to the Great Recession.

Fiscal effort for total adjusted IDD spending in Florida for FY 2017 remains below that of pre-Great Recession levels.










In 2017, Florida ranked as the third most populous state in the nation with nearly 21 million residents. Of that 21 million, 25% (5.2 million) were estimated to be 60 years or older. Florida also ranks third in the nation in terms of the percentage of residents over the age of 60.

In 2017, there were an estimated 472,644 people with IDD in the state of Florida, 75% (352,726) of whom live with a family



caregiver. Of the estimated 352,726 family caregivers, 31% (110,955) were over the age of 60 years. A recent survey of Florida families confirms there is a growing number of aging caregivers; 32% of survey respondents indicated they were 60+.

In FY 2017, only 6% (19,463) of the 352,726 family caregivers who had a person with IDD living in their home received services from the Florida Agency for Persons with Disabilities. The number of these families receiving supports dropped 2.6% between FYs 2016 - 2017. In June of 2019, there were 21,661 individuals on a waitlist for IDD services.<sup>ix</sup>

- ★ Florida ranks 3rd in the nation in both population and residents over the age of 60.
- **★**75% of people with IDD in Florida live with a family caregiver and 31% of those family caregivers are over the age of 60.
- **★**Only 6% of Florida's family caregivers received supports from the Florida Agency for Persons with Disabilities in FY 2017.
- ★ There are 21,661 individuals on a waitlist for IDD services in Florida.

# SAVE AND IMPROVE THE IBUDGET WAIVER



The Florida Developmental Disabilities Council (FDDC) works to change laws in order to help people with disabilities. This year, our main focus will be the iBudget Medicaid waiver. The iBudget waiver helps people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) receive needed services for health and safety and living in their community.



FDDC will work to save and improve the iBudget waiver. In 2019, Florida lawmakers ruled that the Agency for Healthcare Administration (AHCA) and the Agency for People with Disabilities (APD) should make changes to the iBudget waiver. These changes are designed to save money.

However, we want to make sure that any changes made to the iBudget waiver do not get in the way of helping people with I/DD stay included in their communities. We don't want people forced into institutions or more expensive programs.



#### RECOMMENDATIONS

- We support yearly increases in the use of the iBudget waiver that match the need for more services under this funding. By better understanding the needs of those receiving the waiver, future costs can be planned better.
- We support taking 10% of people off the iBudget waitlist each year. The yearly budget for the waiver should include a regular reduction of the iBudget waitlist.
- We support increasing provider rates for all iBudget personal support services. This will increase the availability of providers and improve job stability for care workers.
- We do not support the use of for-profit managed care organizations for people with I/DD.
  - **a.** People with I/DD have long-term care needs that are not the same as the urgent health care needs of people in institutions like hospitals.
  - **b.** Very little data exists about using managed care for people with I/DD, so it is hard to determine if this is a good solution.

I want to take this opportunity to thank you for your service for our great state and for your dedication to your office. I also want to thank you for allowing me to speak this afternoon.

My name is Dina Justice, mom to Emily. Emily is a beautiful and energetic non-verbal 18 year old with autism, a history of aggression and property destruction. Due to her behaviors, it was not safe for her or us for her to remain living in our home. She has lived away from us for the past 5 years due to the lack of services in the Pensacola area. She is currently living at The ARC St. Johns in St. Augustine in an extensive intensive behavioral (EIB) group home and she has made great progress in the last nine months. We travel every 4 or 5 weeks to visit with her and have done so for the last 5 years.

While I know budget cuts and reduction of services would be the easiest options for the APD Redesign Waiver, as a parent, I don't feel this is in the best interest for Emily or the developmental disabilities population. Properly funding the waiver would allow her and others to receive the individual services they need to live successful and meaningful lives. Emily needs 24/7, line of sight care as well as hand over hand assistance with daily living and life skills. The Medicaid waiver allows her to receive these services in her current group home. Like I mentioned before, she is doing well in her EIB group home because of the services and supports she receives. To take her out of that environment would be counterproductive and would very well place her and our family back in crisis. Most likely she would be placed back into an institutional or hospital setting.

In addition, I don't feel that managed care is an option for her or for others with developmental disabilities. For the developmental disabilities population this is something that is not going away. Emily, like many others, will need services throughout her life. Their disabilities can't be "fixed" like a sprained ankle or broken arm as these are lifelong conditions and can't be treated. According to the CDC, "Autism Spectrum Disorder is a life-long disorder that, depending on the severity of symptoms, differs in the intensity of care needed. Along with symptom management, ASD is often associated with co-morbid disorders that may require long-term care and monitoring." \* These individuals can, however, be allowed to live successfully in their individual family homes, group homes or independently with proper supports and services in place.

As a parent of a child with developmental disabilities, I feel that it is time that Florida adequately fund services for this population. The services they, and Emily, need should be properly estimated and projected so these Floridians can receive the health and safety they deserve in their communities. We need healthcare, not managed care.
